#### Editor's notes

Orchids are a cash crop! Yes, but not what we usually regard in this day and age as a 'cash crop', the term lends itself to imagining practices with plants that are not grown to admire but to be processed into all forms of tradeable resources, both legal and illegal. Perhaps our most tradeable orchid is the Phalaenopsis. When I first started on my orchid journey 36 years ago and discovered Phalaenopsis they were very limited in the range of colours and size, compared to what is available now. They were primarily based on 2 species, *Phal. amabalis*, and *Phal. schilleriana*, hence there were pinks, whites with yellow lips and red lips and pinks with white and red lips and combinations of hues in these colours. Most where large formal types. Some were combined with what was then classed as Doritis species such as, *equestris* and *violacea* resulting in mainly the same colours but with an increased number of smaller flowers and that was pretty much it. 119

Without doubt it was the rise of the Taiwanese economy in the 1990's and their government's sponsoring of their then fledgling orchid industry that changed the Phalaenopsis paradigm so to speak. Their investment resulted in the research into orchids as a 'cash crop' to take advantage of the potential of orchids in general, and in particular Phalaenopsis as part of the world-wide flower trade, but not as in cut flowers but as 'potted flowers', the outcome being the industry of today. As a result, it was in the 1990's that hobbyists started to gain access to some of the 'new breeding' that was coming from Taiwan. It was trailblazers like Robertson's Orchids in Nambour that persisted in importing flasks for the hobbyists and soon previously un-heard of combinations of colours started to appear. Even the fabled yellow Phalaenopsis became a reality, slowly morphing from dusty shades to the bright yellows and oranges now readily available. In addition, we now have the amazing contemporary array of spots, stripes and harlequins that would have once been unimaginable. Having been to the annual Taiwan Orchid Growers Show in 2015, it gave an insight into the

Having been to the annual Taiwan Orchid Growers Show in 2015, it gave an insight into the immensity of the trade in Phalaenopsis and lets you appreciate that the hobby-trade is really only a very small side issue. Shipping and Aircraft containers of flowering Phalaenopsis are sent daily to all parts of the world were the majority of people live in high-rise units where the unnamed 'Phallies' provide some colour in their world and are then disposed of once the flower is spent; much cheaper and longer lasting than a bunch of flowers!

While visiting the US in April this world-wide trade was brought home to me quiet markedly in that most super markets we visited had what seems to be a global standard shop fitment these day of a flower sales booth; with exactly the same hybrids and labels just like at home.

### **Growers Tip**

An old adage that rings true in many ways is 'cleanliness is next to godliness. For orchid growers, keeping a 'clean' greenhouse is one of the best investments a grower can make in protecting all the time and effort you put into your collection. What do I mean? You don't have to get down on all fours and scrub the floor or wash the shade-cloth. But consider the constant battle with pests and diseases we face, caused in a lot of ways by confining many plants within a relative small area when compared to their natural habitat where the ratio of orchid species may be 1plant to 2squaremiles or greater Think about the ways we inadvertently contribute to disease and spreading it through our collection. For instance, how many of us keep a bucket or container to store fallen leaves and spent flowers. How often is it emptied? The

longer you leave it the more it becomes an active disease breeding site of your own making. Consider this, each time the watering system operates it tops up the decomposition process resulting in you having a nice little festering disease maker working right in the centre of your collection.

Do you really want a compost bin in your green house? So next time you rake up the leaves and spent flowers especially in winter, empty the bin as well!

It was a pleasure to see the spectacular garden with its many colourful bromeliads, orchids, succulents and other plants. The garden reflects Maxine's artistic flair. Thanks go to the Maunders for the inviting us to visit. I am sure many of us have gained more ideas to incorporate into our own gardens. Before afternoon tea, I drew members attention to the June publication of *Orchids Australia* which features an article called 'One Day Wonders - Ephemeral Beauty.' *Dendrobium (Den.) crumenatum* is described in this article and we had discussed this species and viewed a plant (not flowering) at the May Growers Group. Those who don't subscribe to *Orchids Australia* are able to borrow this magazine from the Club Library.

Oncidinae was the topic of discussion for the afternoon. My first experience of this genre was the 'Dancing Lady' orchid grown in many gardens. This is actually *Oncidium sphacelatum*. Maxine and Graham have several of these plants growing in trees and in pots. According to OrchidWiz X4.3, *Onc.sphacelatum* has 564 registered progeny in the orchid world. Some of the other flowering plants on show from the Handley orchid house were *Oncidesa* (*Oncsa*.) Sweet Sugar, *Oncidium* (*Onc.*) Sunlight 'Pesky Panther', *Oncostele* (*Ons.*) Catatante, *Oncidium* (*Onc.*) Twinkle 'Red Fantasy' and *Tolumnia* (*Tolu.*) Jairak 'Yellow'. # **Species of the Month**

The species of the month is *Oncidium cebolleta*. This oncidium belongs to the group that that is given the colloquial sobriquet of 'Rat Tail' Oncidiums. When contemplating this orchid's structure, it does not take much imagination to conceived how it received its common name. The terete leaves are pendulous in its natural growth and form a combined structure from which they emanate. It is definitely not a rhizome nor is it monopodial so it is a novelty in that respect as well as with its unique leaves. A little research shows why its structure has evolved in this manner. It is an extremely tough character indeed, growing in all manner of climates in Central America from elevated positions to semi-arid and marginal desert areas on trees rocks and even human made hosts such as fence posts. Like all orchids that have terete and semi-terete leaves their

secondary role is to catch moisture and water and funnel it to the roots, acting as a survival mechanism to help in harsh dry climates where rainfall is seasonal, short in duration and limited. One research source dedicated it as the most numerous and widespread of all

Oncidinae species, which was a surprise; but not so much when you re-consider its growth habit and structure as described above.

My experience with this orchid over decades is what could be described as an on-off fatal affair; fortunately, only fatal for the orchid. It certainly does **not like excessive humidity**. Growing a mixed collection like most and trying to cater for different genera has proved trying for this little beauty in that fungal and rot infections have seen its demise. I again have a few plants and with this current 'affair', I am committed to controlling the amount of water they receive throughout the year as too much can prove fatal in both Summer and Winter. It is almost exclusively grown on a cork mount to which it readily attaches. However, it will grow 'upright' in a pot as indicated in Pic 1. One for the collector who likes to grow something different.
