General Business:

- > The Society has purchased \$3,200 worth of Terry Dean's Orchid Collection to be used for raffles throughout the year.
- The June General Meeting raffle contained quite a few of these plants, future general meetings won't have as many raffle prizes. Thanks to Bernard Hilse for bringing along pumpkins for the raffle.
- The numbers for the bus trip to the STOCQ Conference were too low to go ahead with the coach component. There were only 12 names received with a minimal of 30 required. The coach booking will be cancelled. There are over 20 members driving down to the conference. Some going down on Thursday for judging & entering plants.
- Rooms are still booked for the conference at the Ramada by Wyndham at Hervey Bay, those wishing to take a room must advise Jeff Bloxsom soon, so the rooms not required can by cancelled. The room cost is \$215 each which includes breakfast each morning.







Orchid of the month

For this month's newsletter I will cover the genera *Liparis*. A well grown plant *Liparis grossa*. was tabled at our June Meeting. Though this plant did not receive any awards, I think its unusual qualities makes it a great genus to cover. I love purchasing unique orchids and species so I will be looking out for a plant of this variety in the future to add to my collection.

Liparis grossa - A warm growing epiphyte found in low elevation forests from Myanmar to the Philippines. This species has a very short rhizome, so the plump, rounded pseudobulbs are close-set, making for an attractive, compact growth habit. Each spike produces multiple very small orange flowers.

Liparis Rich. 1817 **Pronunciation – LIP-per-ris** Tribe: Vandeae Subtribe:

Louis C. Richard established this cosmopolitan genus in 1818. The generic epithet is from the Greek *liparos* = greasy or shining and refers to the shiny leaves of many of the species. Type species for this genus is *Liparis loeselii*. There are two distinct growth habits in this genus, terrestrial and epiphytic. The terrestrial species usually have a single large leaf on a single stem whereas the epiphytes have pseudobulbs, which are unifoliate. Commonly grown species are *Liparis condylobulbon, Liparis latifolia, Liparis nutans,* and *Liparis viridiflora*.

Number of species: The World Checklist of Monocotyledons recognises more than 500 species and their variety forms. (2007)

Distribution: Found throughout the temperate and tropical areas of the world.

The Northern Regional STOCI panel met recently on the 8th of June at the residence of Paul and Jana Bennett at Glenlee; to assess a first flowering seedling which had been vetted earlier and deemed worthy to proceed to full panel assessment. Thus, a panel of 9 judges including 3 who travelled from the Gladstone/Calliope area completed the Award Judging process. Requiring a score of 75 for an award, they considered the plant worthy of a Highly Commended Certificate scoring 77 points. Needless to say, Jana and Paul were delighted as this was their first award and I think the first of many more to come. The plant was bred by Ray Bills, and I understand was a gift to Jana and Paul. Jana and Paul have decided to recognise Ray in its name which yet has to be registered with the Royal Horticultural Society.

Weeds, Pests Etc

A frustrating weed that most of us have found amongst our orchids is what is known as Kirkwood's Curse or Mackinney's Menace. Years ago, I purchased an orchid and not long after this beautiful white flowering plant came up, not knowing what it was like I didn't destroy it. I am now regretting my actions years later. This plant develops extremely long roots that are hard to remove from orchid pots without repotting. The best part is when the flowers open, they release hundreds of seeds that float amongst the



greenhouse and garden and quickly propagate.

Pseudanthemum variable

Few growers in this region are not plagued by this pest, variously known as Kirkwood's Curse or Mackinney's Menace after the two nurseries that have been blamed for introducing it to orchid collections. It is a plant native to the dry sclerophyll forests along the eastern coast of Australia. It is cultivated and sold by some plant nurseries as the "Butterfly Plant" because it is said to be attractive to four or more species.

The plants are fast-growing and commence seeding at an early stage. Seed capsules explode on maturity, scattering seed which can be wind-borne over a range of several metres. Once you have it, it will quickly spread through your orchid collection and throughout your garden. Orchid potting media provide the ideal hosts. Plants have a long taproot, often bifurcated, usually similar in length to the height of the plant. Most attempts to pull plants out of a pot or the ground result in breakage at ground level, leaving behind the root system which will promptly re-grow. The only way to effectively remove the weed from potted orchids is to re-pot, removing all traces of the taproot from the plant's root ball. For plants with tightly matted roots, this can be difficult. An alternative, suggested by Wayne Turville at Australian Orchid Nursery (Melbourne), is to paint the leaves of the weed with concentrated (50%) Glyphosate. You would need to be very careful not to get any Glyphosate at this strength on your plant and watering should be withheld for at least 48 hours.

Plants containing this weed in the pot can be deemed to be not in "Show Bench Condition" as defined by the AOC Judging Handbook. To avoid the risk of spreading this pest to other growers, exhibitors at shows or meetings should ensure that all such plants are removed from pots beforehand.

Another plant which is the bane of orchid growers is Oxalis. There are over 800 different species of this plant but the most common weeds of them are the yellowwood sorrell or the creeping wood sorrel. Both have grown in my orchid pots, the clumping one and the one that goes round and round the edges of the orchid pot. A few growers have used aeroguard to kill this pest, I haven't tried it as I normally just pull the plants out. Again, a careful brushing of Glyphosate to the leaves would probably work on killing this pest.



Using Algaecide to control moss, algae and bacteria in orchid collections

At our March meeting, a lively discussion took place with regard to controlling moss in orchid collections. Many growers found that rampant moss growth prevented water getting down into the orchid growth medium, particularly where automatic watering systems were in use. Based on the following article, put together by Jim Brydie (a Sydney grower), I have been using swimming pool algaecide for some time to successfully control algae and brown rots in my collection, and have noticed that it also reduces moss growth.

Benzalkonium chloride is used in swimming pool algaecides to control algae and bacterial growth (e.g. Alginox, Algitrol and many others). It is also the active ingredient in a number of products registered in Australia for control of algae, moss, lichen and liverworts in lawns, on paths etc. (e.g. Yates 'Surrender' and others). The Royal Horticultural Society recommends the use of algaecides based on benzalkonium chloride, where it's necessary to remove mosses and lichens. Benzalkonium chloride probably also has anti-viral properties, as it is the active ingredient in a number of medical anti-viral cleaning solutions, although at much lower concentrations.

The dosage rates in Jim Brydie's table below are based on swimming pool algaecides that have 150g/l benzalkonium chloride in them. Alginox, Algitrol and the other brands I've looked at, all use this concentration. There are plenty of brands to choose from, and the swimming pool algaecides are quite strong enough for orchid culture and safer to use (and cheaper) than the horticultural 'moss-killers' mentioned, which usually contain benzalkonium chloride at the much higher concentration of 500g/l. If you choose to use the more concentrated horticultural moss-killers, such as the Yates product designed for lawns, paths etc., you will need to adjust the concentration accordingly for use in orchid culture, and be much more concerned about safety. Do check the label to make sure that the product you use does not also contain Copper salts or Boron, as these are potentially harmful to plants in larger doses (if unsure, check the APVMA website, link below).

Looking at the Australian safety data sheets, benzalkonium chloride is rated as non-hazardous in the concentrations used in swimming pool algaecides (150g/I), but hazardous in the concentrations used in moss-killers (500g/I) – with the potential to cause skin irritation & eye damage if splashed, and breathing difficulties if ingested. As Jim says, always take safety precautions - don't drink it or splash it about, wear rubber gloves and wash hands after use.

In his article, Jim Brydie mentions an alternative horticultural product called Physan, which includes the same active ingredient. It is marketed in the US as a "broad range disinfectant, fungicide, virucide, and algaecide which effectively controls a wide variety of pathogens on hard surfaces and plants". However, it is no longer registered for use in Australia. (As an interesting aside, one American grower using Physan to control algae in a hydroponics system noted in a blog that it left no harmful residue if the leaves were dried and smoked! I guess he wasn't growing orchids...)

ALGINOX as a Disinfectant - Jim Brydie

Alginox is a liquid sanitizer used for control of algae and bacteria in SwimmingPools. It has the same active ingredient as a once popular, but much more expensive, orchid/plant disease control product called Physan (ie dimethyl benzyl ammonium chlorides, and ethyl benzyl ammonium chlorides). As far as I know, the guidelines in the table below were put together by a nurseryman on the North Coast of NSW about 20 years ago. The rates recommended are believed to be quite safe for all orchids and in fact, the experience of a few local users suggests you might even want to slightly increase the suggested rates.

However! As with the use of any chemical, <u>you should proceed with caution</u>. Use gloves, don't drink it or get it in your eyes, keep it away from children, etc etc etc. You also never know if some plants may be more sensitive than others, or if effects in some circumstances may differ. <u>Usage is at your own risk</u>. Please read all directions on the Alginox container before using it, and test on samples in your own conditions before making any decision to use more widely.

If you think Alginox might be helpful to you and you would like to try it, it is currently available (Jan 2012) in most Woolworth's supermarkets, in the pool chlorine section and in some K-Marts (Hornsby at least). A 2.5 litre container cost about \$10-\$12 so it is cheap as chips.


